Our programs foster success for our diverse community of learners in an environment that supports and celebrates growth and achievement, and promotes respect and accountability to one's self, peers, and community.

**NEO's New Vistas High School** is a free public alternative charter school that offers a fully accredited high school diploma. Small class sizes, flexible scheduling, and a dedicated faculty help students address barriers that affect student success.

**NEO's Adult Education** offers classes and testing for the HSE (formerly the GED), career certifications, English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, citizenship test preparation, and career counseling.

The 2019-2020 school year was one of growth for NEO. We also successfully weathered changes amid the pandemic. Our staff and students are resilient, and I am honored to be part of this journey with them.



# NEO is partner-driven

To expand our organizational capacity, we embarked on strategic partnerships in the 2019-2020 school year. With the help of other local organizations, we were able to serve more students throughout Northwest Indiana.



#### **Ivy Tech**

With Ivy Tech Valparaiso, we removed the barrier of attending college without a high school diploma through a program called Diploma+ NWI, a "reverse" model of dual credit. Students 22 and older who need 12 or fewer high school credits can finish an accelerated diploma from NEO while starting classes with Ivy Tech.



#### Welcome Network, Lake Station Library

Free monthly immigration nights provided legal guidance and social service information thanks to a grant from Legacy Foundation and partnerships with the Welcome Network and Lake Station Library. The grant likewise allowed us to expand our volunteer base, more than doubling our number of volunteers.



#### Valparaiso Alternative Learning Experience (VALE)

NEO provided professional development for educators at VALE in TASC testing and support for HSE testers and learners.



#### Communities in Schools (CIS) Lake County.

Increased student services and referrals to support organizations were provided to New Vistas students via a Resource Coordinator through CIS Lake County.



#### Duneland League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC)

New Vistas continued our student communications club, Phoenix Voices. The two-year program aimed to reduce dropout rates by exploring STEM projects, career paths, and activities for student engagement. Thank you to the Duneland League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), in partnership with a grant from Ford Driving Dreams.

## New at **NEO**





#### **New Vistas**

We added Information Technology to our Career & Technical Education (CTE) pathway options for the new Indiana Department of Education graduation pathway plan. This is in addition to Advanced Manufacturing, Business, Art, and Health Science.

Staff were formally trained in Restorative Practices, a counseling strategy that places emphasis on solving interpersonal problems rather than punitive discipline to foster a culture of community, trust, and accountability.



#### **Adult Education**

We began offering a new career certification, ServSafe. ServSafe is the restaurant and food service industry's leading certification. NEO offers four parts: food handler, allergens, food manager, and alcohol. It's available in English and Spanish, so many of our ESL students were able to become certified in their native language.

Thanks to grants from **Dollar General** and the **Porter County Community Foundation,** as well as a donation from **Healthlinc,** NEO was able to upgrade staff and student technology throughout the building. Without these upgrades early in the year, we would not have been equipped to tackle remote learning during COVID.

#### **Funding Sources**

New Vistas High School, like all public schools, receives per pupil state tuition for each student and comprises the bulk of funding. State and federal grants (Title 1, Special Education, Adult Education) also contribute significantly. Local funding (grants, donations, and rentals) rounds out the remainder of our income.

#### **Annual Accountibility**

NEO has received a "clean opinion" from independent auditors and the State Board of Accounts every year since our opening in 2011.

in public assistance each time a dropout (or potential dropout) finishes a high school diploma or equivalent.




Consumer spending and home ownership is higher among those who have finished high school.
